- Eastbourne Masonic Centre Tuesday 30th October 2018


Each session is a 6.45pm arrival for a 7pm start, finishing by 8.30pm.

Martletts Allotment Project supported by Sussex Freemasons

The project that will help bereaved men whilst they work an allotment has received a £16,000 grant from Sussex Freemasons.

Martlets will be recruiting a counsellor and volunteers to run six 8-week programmes, which will begin in the summer, allowing 48 men who have experienced loss to be supported.

The grant from Sussex Freemasons comes through the Masonic Charitable Foundation which is funded by Freemasons, their families and friends from across England and Wales.

Jane Cato, the Counselling and Bereavement Services Manager at Martlets said, "We're very grateful to Sussex Freemasons for their generous grant. There isn't currently any specific provision in the city solely for bereaved men to come together as a group for counselling or peer support; which makes this project unique.

"The social aspect of meeting at the allotment will be very important. We will be looking to create an environment where the men can gain mutual support, use nature as a source of healing and begin to share their

experiences of grief.




"It's an opportunity to get outside, socialise and draw strength from others who acutely understand what loss feels like."

Never Forgotten


Eric Misselke writes: In answer to Mrs D Cook's question regarding the "Forget-Me-Nots" badge in the December issue, I can advise that the organisation concerned is Freemasonry.

The background to the forget-me-not emblem goes back to the 1930s and the Second World War, where Freemasonry was outlawed by the German Nazi regime. In fact, along with the millions of others who perished in the gas chambers, a good number of Freemasons were also killed – just for being Freemasons.

However, in order that Freemasonry could continue and so that Freemasons could recognise each other, a small forgetme-not emblem was worn by them on the left lapel of their jacket or coat.

This practice was continued after the war and was brought over to Britain in the 1950s and 60s (probably by members of the armed forces who had been stationed in Germany). The practice flourished and, although not worn very often, the emblem is still worn by a goodly number of Freemasons in the UK to this day – particularly when they are going to their lodge meetings.




Lodge of Sussex and colleagues from Companion Orders at the Annual Service. For the first time we were invited to wear Masonic Collars which was subsequently approved by

Now that the petition has been granted by Grand Lodge the consecration of Artemis Lodge No 9964 can go ahead on the 10th November at the Brighton Centre. The formation of a lodge has been a natural progression out the activities of the Sussex Masonic Shooting Sports Association that's been holding regular, informal, clay shoots at Southdown GC on the first Wednesday in the month.

The name Artemis, the Greek Goddess of Hunting, appropriate as it reflects the shooting activities of founders and members that will soon be joining. Like many similar lodges, Artemis will have a strong shooting theme, use of shooting artefacts in meetings and game on the menu for the festive board. It will be meeting at the Chichester Masonic Centre on the first Tuesday of February, April, October and November. order to appeal to busy people, the regular meetings will be limited to four a year and kept as short as possible. It's intended that an extra, white table, meeting will be arranged at a different venue in the summer around a clay shoot to enable partners wives and

participate.

Naturally supporting charity is high on the list of priorities and a clay shoot has been organised at Southdown in aid of the RNLI on the 18th August. This will be a full day out starting at 10am with a 100-bird shoot followed by a flush and a "black powder experience" in the afternoon. To make wives and partners welcome a "have a go" stand will be organised for those who haven't shot before. The cost is a very reasonable £49 to include the 100-bird shoot, breakfast and lunch; if you're not shooting the cost is only £12.

SUSSEX MARK MASONS FUND PCaSO PSA TESTS

The Provincial Grand Master of Sussex Mark Masonry, Martin Wilson, had great pleasure in presenting a cheque for £1,500.00 to Roger Bacon, Chair of PCaSO (Prostate Cancer Support Organisation), at the Normandy Masonic Centre, Horsham on Thursday 19 July 2018.



In June Sussex Mark Masons hosted a day of PSA (Prostate Specific Antigen) testing by PCaSO at Horsham for men from the local community aged over 45. The tests were provided free by Sussex Mark Masons and 154 men were tested on the day, 5 were found to have abnormally high readings and 3 were borderline, the rest were within the normal range for their age.

Martin Wilson, in handing over the cheque, said "I am delighted that we have been able to provide this useful service for the community and am hopeful in doing so that we may have been able to save some lives."

Roger Bacon of PCaSO on receiving the cheque from Martin Wilson thanked him and the Sussex Mark Masons for generously supporting the PSA testing event and said, "This money will help our charity continue with our programme of free PSA test events all around Sussex."

The event ran very smoothly on time throughout the day, with complimentary comments from men who attended. In all a very successful event which we hope to repeat again next year.

Sussex Freemasons Donate £30,000 To Support Local Disabled Children

Hundreds of families with disabled children in Brighton and Hove will be helped to claim the benefits they are

entitled to, thanks to a generous donation from Sussex Freemasons to Amaze's Disability Living Allowance (DLA) Project.

The £30,000 Masonic grant will help Amaze to provide a team of trained volunteers to support the most disadvantaged families to complete benefit claims and run regular workshops. We are also planning to develop new digital resources to help families complete their own claims, which will we will be piloting with a group of families in East Sussex.

The extra income from a successful claim for DLA or Personal Independence Payment (PIP), including benefits like Carers Allowance, amounts to between £8,000-13,000 per year for most households, which helps families to meet the additional costs of



bringing up a disabled child or young person. Once a family's immediate financial hardship is resolved, the DLA Project also signposts disabled young people and parents to other sources of support and advice, for example local support groups or training courses, helping to further improve the wellbeing and social inclusion of the whole family.

Disabled young people to live a DREAM thanks to Sussex Freemasons

Disabled young people at Chailey Heritage Foundation near Haywards Heath have received a significant boost to their planned state-of-the-art DREAM Centre, following a £25,000 grant from Sussex Freemasons.

The Charity launched a £3.1 million appeal in 2016 to replace their ageing 1950s hall with a building large enough for children and young people with complex disabilities to participate in a mixture of arts and physical activities. Wheelchair football, power chair driving, trampolining, drama and dance will all be on offer alongside the sensory four-dimensional experience, which will allow children to be 'transported' to different countries and experience sights and sounds from around the world.

The D.R.E.A.M (dynamic, real, experiential, amazing, magical) Centre is the latest chapter in the story of the Chailey Heritage Foundation, which has been changing the lives of young people with disabilities since 1903.

Ellie, a pupil at Chailey Heritage School, is a competitive child and typical of the young people who will benefit from the new facilities. The D.R.E.A.M. Centre will be jam packed with sporting activities. This new indoor space will also house the powered wheelchair driving school which will benefit many of the young people, including Ellie, who are learning to drive.

Carol, a teacher at Chailey Heritage School, who has been helping Ellie to reach her full potential, said "Thanks to Sussex Freemasons and all the other generous donors, the D.R.E.A.M. Centre will make it possible for Ellie and her friends to have a space large enough to play competitive sports and perform to friends and family on the purpose-built stage along with lots of other opportunities."

The grant from Sussex Freemasons comes through the Masonic Charitable Foundation, which is funded by Freemasons, their families and friends, from across England and Wales.

TLC Appeal

The TLC Appeal originated after an allergic reaction suddenly caused the swelling and blocking of the windpipe of the wife of a Freemason. Her life was saved by the rapid action of the medical staff at an A&E unit, who were able to resuscitate and stabilise her. They are both eternally grateful for the swift and caring attention that she received but found the experience the most frightening of their lives and speculated on the distress that children must face when visiting A&E units.

The idea of doing something useful for medical staff at A&E units was discussed with other local Freemasons, and from that point the compulsive idea of "Teddies for Loving Care" was born. The Appeal was launched in Essex in 2001 and has since been adopted by most of the Masonic provinces across the country. Prior to the launch, a great deal of research was carried out. Hospitals were asked how many teddies would be needed. We had to establish what style and size of teddy would be suitable to meet stringent toy safety regulations and be 'cuddly' enough to appeal to small children. After 12 years, that support and enthusiasm for the Appeal still exists and well over 1,000,000 teddies have now been distributed nationwide. Most of the money raised to fund the Appeal comes from Freemasons themselves through lodge donations, but we also receive some donations from grateful individuals and the sale of TLC merchandise.

Not every child visiting A&E will receive a bear. The medical staff use their discretion and will give a bear to a child that is suffering particularly from trauma, injury or illness. They use the bears to befriend the children, to reward them for being brave and in some cases to demonstrate what they are going to do.

One A&E Sister said "I cannot remember how we used to cope before the Teddies. I hope that you can continue to supply them for a long time".

Another said, "It's not just a teddy, it's so much more."

As the TLC Appeal is a Masonic initiative, it's pure nature has also benefited Freemasonry, by raising the level of public awareness of the contribution made to the community by Freemasonry, a greater understanding of the principles on which Freemasonry is founded, and how those principles are exercised in the modern world.

Did you know that ... In England, Wales and Ireland (North and South, a distressed child receives a TLC Bear on average every 2 ½ minutes which is 24 Teddies every hour, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.
